


LUMSDEN & DISTRICT

Welcome to the Museum! We are located at 50 Qu'Appelle Drive West in the Town of Lumsden. Tour our buildings and displays from 11am – 4pm, Thursday to Sunday, in July and August, or by appointment in May, June and September.

Hunter House



The Hunter House was once located on land that is now the Lumsden Sports Centre (rink). The home was built in 1910 by the local Blacksmith and later lived in by the Hunter family until 1990 when it was donated to the museum in 1993. It is decorated with various antiques from the early and mid 1900's, reminiscent of its actual use.

Forest Church



Step back in time and experience the cozy Forest Church. The original stained glass windows are still intact!

The Presbyterian church was constructed in 1897 and services were held until the congregation amalgamated with St Andrew's United Church in Lumsden in 1957.

Forest Church was dismantled by Lumsden Museum volunteers in 1993 and reassembly on the museum site began in 1996. Forest Church was re-dedicated on September 20, 1997. 100 years after it was originally opened.




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Kedelston School



Kedleston School was built in 1912 in the Hamlet of Kedleston, northwest of Regina Beach. This one-room building was used for school, church, weddings and agricultural shows until 1963. The school was moved to the museum in 1988 and contains an array of displays such as the historical floods, clothing, indigenous displays, tools & equipment.




The Lumsden & District Museum is home to many more displays including a general store, livery, blacksmith shop, antique vehicles and farm equipment.

Tregarva Hall



Tregarva Hall was constructed in 1890 near the Village of Tregarva and served as a rural school until a larger school was built in 1907. It then was used as a community centre and continued this function after being acquired by the Grain Growers Association in 1917. From 1914 to 1925 the building was used as a Presbyterian, Methodist, and a United Church until 1952. When the congregation joined the Brora United Church that year, the Tregarva Curling Club purchased the building and subsequently moved it into Tregarva in 1955. After the last community dance in June 1980, the building sat vacant until being moved to the museum site in the early 1990s. It contains displays of antique items, military uniforms, medical instruments, general store items and more.

Edwards Log House



- The house was constructed in 1902 for Jack and Bessie Edwards, a pioneer ranching family in the Little Arm River Valley, east of Findlater.
- The log house was built using logs from their homestead. The larger logs were obtained from the Macdowall area south of Prince Albert.
- Jack and Bessie's youngest son lived in this house as a bachelor from 1916 until his death in 2002.
